

► Undulating green pastures longowned by the Armstrong and Porter families were purchased by Sunshine Coast Council between 1995 and 2005 to create the 128-hectare Maleny Community Precinct, incorporating our 18-hole golf course.

Course construction started in early 2014. The first 9 holes opened in June 2015 and the second nine holes in February 2020, thanks to a massive volunteer effort under the guidance of the club's award-winning Superintendent Mick McCombe.

In May 2020 Australia's 2013 Masters Champion and world number six-ranked golfer at the time, Adam Scott, enjoyed playing the completed course socially several times and rated it very highly.





Brief History and Design Philosophy

► Maleny Golf Club has since continued to evolve as an attractive destination for players of all abilities seeking a unique new golfing challenge and some good old-fashioned country hospitality.



► The Management Committee's (MC) intent was to lay out Maleny's "links-style" golf course over the existing terrain with minimal disturbance to the natural landscape.

► Significant earthworks were to be confined to the greens and tees, with the fairways mown over the existing contours. In other words, just like "golf as it began".



► The unique nature of links courses necessitates a distinct style of play dictated by both topography – uneven open fairways, thick rough long grass and undulating greens with deep revetted <u>bunkers</u> – and climate - windy and often wet conditions which Maleny can present similar to coastal Scotland.











► The MC decided the greens would be of a high standard with the tees built using the natural red soil and existing kikuyu on site.

► A minimalist approach was adopted to retain a strong relationship between the natural and built environments while cost-effectively blending the course into the surrounding landscape. This environmentally friendly golf course was consequently also to be less expensive to construct and maintain, and more aesthetically pleasing to the eye.



Scottish inspiration

► The Machrihanish Dunes golf course in Scotland provided the MC with a fine and timely example of this minimalist approach, sharing much in common with Maleny Golf Club's aspirations and regulatory constraints.

► Like Maleny, it was being built over old pastureland with a small construction budget and faced some of the toughest environmental regulations within the European Union due its sensitive coastal location.

Promotionally positioned as "the way golf began", Machrihanish Dunes opened in 2009 and is now rated regularly as one of Scotland's better golf courses. This minimalist approach to course design and construction was then adopted by the MC.





Scottish inspiration

► That same year the MC commissioned golf course architect Graham Papworth of GNP Golf Design Pty Ltd to first create a master plan and then detailed drawings of the first nine "links-style" greens which were designed with deep revetted bunkers.



Scottish inspiration

► To complement the minimalist approach, the MC agreed to retain the natural openness of the course by not planting trees between fairways.

This decision aimed to provide golfers with more playing options while securing longer term savings on maintenance.

Our unique point of difference

► As nearly all golf courses on the Sunshine Coast are "parklandstyle" or "resort" courses, Maleny offers the regional golfing market a unique "slice of Scotland" playing experience.


Graham Papworth's minimalist design requires both playing strategy and skill, but also gives the average player a chance of making par or better.
